

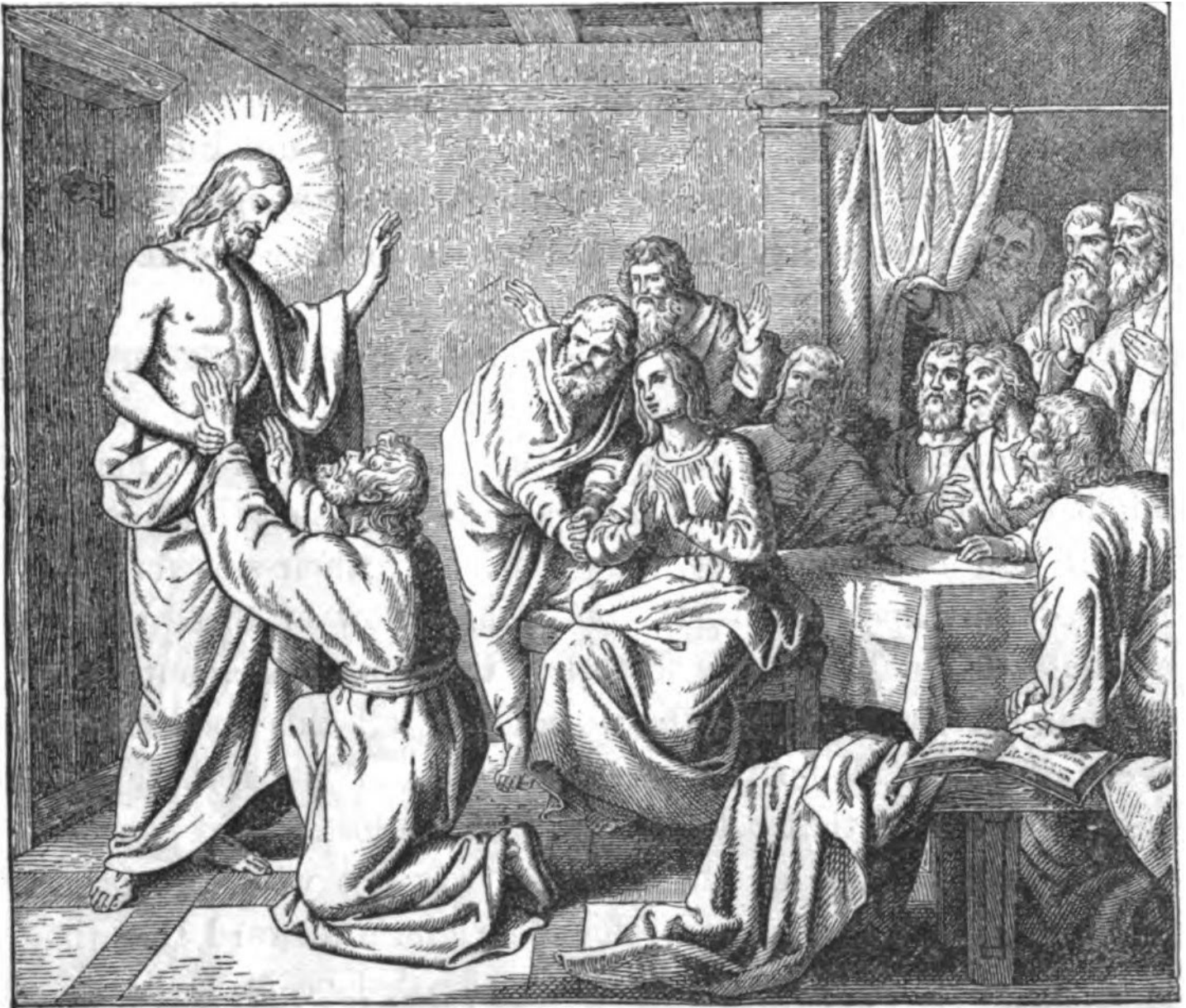

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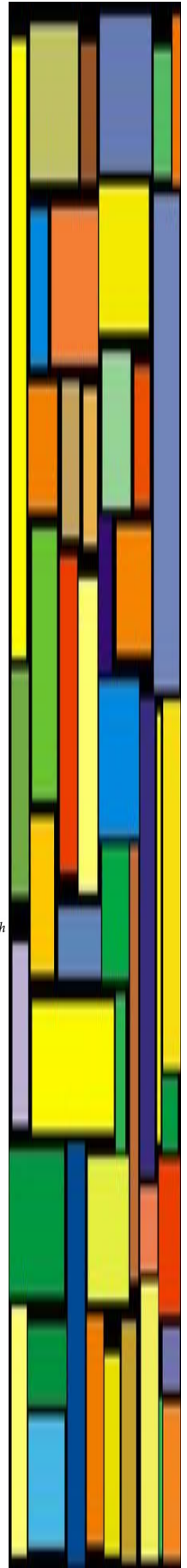

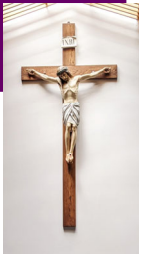

**Sunday, Apr 24, 2022**

**DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY**—Mercy seasons justice  
 Mercy is described as a double blessing in Shakespeare's famous "quality of mercy" speech delivered in *The Merchant of Venice*. Mercy blesses the giver as well as the receiver. We're blessed by being merciful since God promises to be generous to us in the same measure we use with others. Withholding compassion punishes both the denier and the denied. Saint Gertrude the Great expresses gratitude to God for how divine mercy "has led me through the many obstacles I have placed in the way of your love." Love better by loving with compassion.  
**TODAY'S READINGS:** Acts 5:12-16; Revelation 1:9-11a, 12-13, 17-19; John 20:19-31 (45). "Jesus came, although the doors were locked, and stood in their midst and said, 'Peace be with you.'"

**Monday, Apr 25, 2022**

**FEAST OF MARK, EVANGELIST**—Hear him roar  
 Even though the Gospel of Mark comes second in the New Testament, it was the first one written and served as source material for the Gospels of Matthew and Luke. The author of Mark was not one of the 12 apostles but was a friend of Peter, who called him "son," and Paul, with whom he had a bumpy relationship. Mark is depicted in art with the symbol of a winged lion—his gospel may be simple and to the point, but the "roar" of his words certainly took flight! Don't underestimate the power of your own words about the Lord—they too may endure!  
**TODAY'S READINGS:** 1 Peter 5:5b-14; Mark 16:15-20 (555). "Go into the whole world and proclaim the Gospel to every creature."

**Tuesday, Apr 26, 2022**

**EASTER WEEKDAY**—Martyrs for the poor  
 On this day in 1998, Guatemalan Bishop Juan Gerardi Conedera was bludgeoned to death for daring to defend the nation's indigenous people. Conedera was not the first Latin American religious leader—nor the last—to be martyred for championing the "least of these" as Jesus did. But the fate of all such martyrs shines a bright light on Catholic Social Teaching as it emerged from pivotal gatherings of Latin American bishops, i.e., the Medellín ('68) and Puebla ('79) conferences. Quoting Puebla, how can you make a "preferential option for the poor" today?  
**TODAY'S READINGS:** Acts 4:32-37; John 3:7b-15 (268). "So must the Son of Man be lifted up, so that everyone who believes in him may have eternal life."

**Wednesday, Apr 27, 2022**

**EASTER WEEKDAY**—The light outshines the darkness  
 Holocaust Remembrance Day begins at sundown this evening. The Holocaust was one of the darkest moments in human history. It seemed that evil might triumph over good, darkness over light. The Catholic Church of times past sadly watered the deadly seeds of anti-Semitism. Thankfully that has changed in recent decades. Pope John Paul II was instrumental in his visits to synagogues and reinterpreting the New Testament to avoid the anti-Jewish implications that dominated for centuries. Pope Francis has prayed at the Western Wall and Yad Vashem, denouncing anti-Semitism, standing up for Jews when anti-Semitism occurs. Just as Easter Sunday comes after the horror of Good Friday, the light does indeed prevail. We are an Easter people.  
**TODAY'S READINGS:** Acts 5:17-26; John 3:16-21 (269). "But whoever lives the truth comes to the light, so that his works may be clearly seen as done in God."

**Thursday, Apr 28, 2022**

**MEMORIAL OF PETER CHANEL, PRIEST, MARTYR**  
 The stuff that healers are made of  
 The martyrdom of Marist priest Father Peter Chanel, S.M. on the South Seas island of Fortuna could be an action movie. There's a disgruntled king. A bloody fight. Peter Chanel, healer, steps in to treat the injured man, his enemy by any definition. Chanel momentarily turns, and the enemy rises up and strikes him dead. Chanel's murderer much later undergoes a conversion himself and becomes Christian, as does most of the island. One of Chanel's catechumens had said of him, "He loves us. He does what he teaches. He forgives his enemies. His teaching is good." Your personal battles may be less cinematic, but in the communion of saints, Chanel is available to inspire right action against the odds.  
**TODAY'S READINGS:** Acts 5:27-33; John 3:31-36 (270). "Whoever believes in the Son has eternal life."

**Friday, Apr 29, 2022**

**MEMORIAL OF CATHERINE OF SIENA, LAY DOMINICAN, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH**—Grounded in love  
 Saint Catherine of Siena, O.P. models for us balance in our life of prayer and social commitment. Early in her life, she stayed at home and focused fervently on prayer. But God had other plans. Catherine had a vision in which Christ reminded her of the call to love God and neighbor. Catherine's spiritual director wrote that God spoke the following to Catherine: "It is the justice of these two commandments that I want you now to fulfill. On two feet you must walk my way; on two wings you must fly to heaven."  
**TODAY'S READINGS:** Acts 5:34-42; John 6:1-15 (271). "A large crowd followed him, because they saw the signs he was performing on the sick."

**Saturday, Apr 30, 2022**

**EASTER WEEKDAY**—Live free of fear  
 John Dear is a Catholic priest and longtime peace activist, having been arrested more than 75 times in acts of nonviolent civil disobedience. But it wasn't always that way. When he entered priestly formation, he couldn't imagine himself as an activist. His inspiration was Father Daniel Berrigan, S.J., renowned peace activist, poet, and Jesuit priest who died on this day in 2016. Dear writes: "I first met Dan . . . in the early 1980s . . . I remember asking him how in the world I could ever work for peace. 'What are you afraid of?' he asked me. 'Don't be afraid. Don't live in fear. Live in faith and hope and peace.' I was shocked. No one ever said such things to me. I decided then and there to give it a try. Later, I realized: we all need a teacher who tells us not to be afraid." Whatever your particular calling, don't let fear keep you from being your fullest, Christ-like self.  
**TODAY'S READINGS:** Acts 6:1-7; John 6:16-21 (272). "They saw Jesus walking on the sea and coming near the boat, and they began to be afraid. But he said to them, 'It is I. Do not be afraid.'"



# DISCIPLESHIP



A fundamental rule of being a disciple of Christ is the necessity to make sacrifices and deny one's self, Pope Francis said in his Angelus address Sunday, September 16, 2018.

*"Jesus tells us that in order to follow him, to be his disciples, one must deny oneself – that is, the claims of one's own selfish pride – and take up one's very cross," the pope said. "Then he gives everyone a fundamental rule. And what is this rule? 'Whoever wants to save his life will lose it.'"*

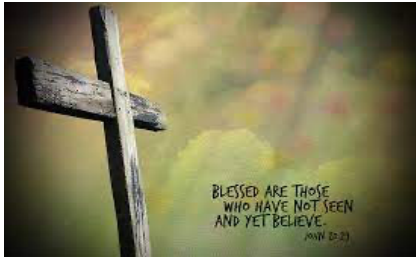
## Our Roses Bloom for Easter

The roses we planted last year around our church are in full bloom! The rose is a Catholic symbol for Mary, Queen of heaven and earth. Mary is also known as the "mystic rose" or the "rose without thorns" because of her role as the mother of Jesus Christ, the world's savior. Before sin entered the world and corrupted it, tradition says the Garden of Eden featured roses with no thorns. Because of Mary's vital role in God's plan to redeem the fallen world, Mary is associated with the original purity and beauty of the roses God originally designed for the Garden of Eden.

Praying the rosary, which means "crown of roses," is a spiritual bouquet to Mary. In our Catholic tradition, all roses symbolize God's love at work in the world, but different colors of roses also symbolize different spiritual concepts. White roses represent purity and holiness. Red roses symbolize passion and sacrifice. Yellow roses mean wisdom and joy, pink roses gratitude and peace, and lavender roses wonder, awe, and change for the better. All five rose colors surround our church.

## Reflection by Patti Calton on the 2nd Sunday of Easter

This is the 1st Sunday after Easter, also called Divine Mercy Sunday. Today we hear an amazing story about Jesus appearing to the disciples after his resurrection. As a Catholic School Principal, my first instinct is to make a Gospel reading relatable and understandable for children. So my reflection here is to do just that.

The disciples are huddled together behind closed doors. They are huddled together in a locked room. The disciples were in seclusion because they were afraid of the Jewish authorities. When they had heard Mary's story that Jesus was alive, they were in disbelief. Behind these closed locked doors, Jesus appeared to his disciples. All disciples were present except for one, Thomas was not in the room at this time. When the disciples shared the story of seeing Jesus, Thomas replied, " *Unless I can see the holes that the nails made in his hands and can put my finger into the holes they made, and unless I can put my hand into his side, I refuse to believe.*"

We think seeing is believing—just like Thomas. But we're also very different from Thomas because Thomas did get to see. He saw Jesus' hands and feet. He touched Jesus' side. He believed because he saw. But we can't do that. None of us get to see Jesus physically today. But we do have the ability to see his work all around us.

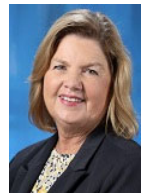
Easter is a day of celebration in the resurrection of Jesus. However it is simply not just a one day celebration but it must be celebrated and made part of our daily lives, day after day, week after week, year after year. And the celebration must not just be a recalling of what has taken place, but also it must lead to our active response in our daily activities.
