



For 1,500 years, Benedictine women and men have been living communally in monasteries all over the world according to the *Rule of St. Benedict*, a succinct guide that emphasizes prayer, work, simplicity, and hospitality. They take unique vows of stability and ongoing conversion. Draw from the ancient wisdom of the Benedictines by reading the *Rule* yourself and see how this way of life might enrich your own.

The United Nations has decreed today International Malala Day—after the Pakistani activist, Malala Yousafzai, who wowed the world with her address to the U.N. on July 12, 2013, which also happened to be Malala's 16th birthday. Only the year before, the young woman was shot in the head by the Taliban for her advocacy of young girls getting an education. Malala was later an attendee at the 2015 U.N. General Assembly, listening as Pope Francis gave his first address there and insisted that the "right to education—also for girls, excluded in certain places"—be "ensured first and foremost." Let nothing hold you back

On this day in 1918, Carlos Manuel Rodríguez Santiago was born into a Catholic family in Puerto Rico. While two of his siblings entered religious life, he was unable to achieve his goal of becoming a priest due to poor health. Even so, he maintained a fervent devotion to promoting the faith, running a magazine and discussion groups covering Catholic liturgy. Illness prevented him from completing college, but he nevertheless became a musical

master and anticipated the liturgical reforms of the Second Vatican Council by promoting active lay participation and vernacular celebrations. He died at age 44 from cancer in 1963, shortly after the Council began, and was beatified in 2001. May Blessed Carlos ever intercede for us to persevere in faith and inspire greater devotion among the faithful!

Make cultural connections

Today's saint, Kateri Tekakwitha (1656-1680), suffered the distrust of both of the cultures she belonged to. Many among her tribe of Mohawks rejected her embrace of Christianity. French Canadians, who dominated the Montreal church that she joined, sometimes held her at arm's length—when she and a devout companion, also indigenous, proposed founding a religious order, church authorities nixed the plan. But as a woman with a foot in both worlds, Kateri is seen today as a bridge between indigenous and European cultures in North America. Reconciliation between different groups is sorely needed today: Saint Kateri, pray for us!

Know your net worth

"If you do not know your own dignity and condition, you cannot value anything at its proper worth," says the wise Saint Bonaventure, noted 13th-century Franciscan theologian and doctor of the church. Take time to think about that admonishment today. Tally your credits and debits—the good and bad you've wrought, your accomplishments and failures. Then remember that nothing goes unnoticed by God: "Even the hairs of your head are all counted" (Matt. 10:30). Why? Because you are God's alone. Let that knowledge shape your understanding of everything. As Bonaventure puts it: "Every creature is a divine word because it proclaims God."

Lay Carmelites attend a monthly meeting in which they wear the Brown Scapular of Our Lady of Mount Carmel as a sign of their dedication to the Virgin Mary. If possible, they participate in daily Mass and try to spend a half hour in meditation each day, reflecting on scripture. Lay Carmelites also pray the Morning and Evening Prayer of the Divine Office. Though they are not professed religious, they practice the virtues of poverty, chastity and obedience. Pray to Our Lady of Mount Carmel to inspire your own spiritual practice.

Retrouvaille provides marriage help!

Saint Joseph Parish is excited to launch a new marriage prep program for our parishioners, called **Witness to Love**. This program is offered to all engaged couples, as well as civilly married couples, seeking marriage in our Church parish. Witness to Love is a Parish Marriage Prep Renewal Movement that gives parishes and mentor couples the tools they need to prepare engaged couples for a marriage that will last. Specifically, it is a tool for us to welcome engaged couples into parish life, by building a support system for them, as a part of their marriage prep. Witness to Love offers engaged couples a way to witness healthy, marital family love and family life from a mentor couple, while integrating them into our parish through a formation plan. The key component of this program is the engaged couple chooses a mentor couple to journey with them in preparing for marriage and they remain as a source of support after the wedding day. The program lasts about six months prior to the wedding date. To help facilitate the process, a virtue based workbook is used by both the couple to be married and their mentor couple. We know that successful marriages don't "just happen". Moving forward, we will be doing marriage preparation as a community. When couples receive the sacrament of matrimony in St. Joseph Church, they are also received into our faith community. Please keep our parish community, engaged couples, mentor couples, and clergy in prayer as we seek to renew and support marriages!

REFLECTION



REFLECTION FOR THE FIFTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME ~

In our Gospel reading this Sunday, St Luke invites us to reflect on a story that most of us can recall by heart, probably because the story is both so simple and powerful in its message. Luke, a masterful storyteller, describes who is neighbor through the lens of Jesus in dialogue with a scholar who asks these pointed questions: "What must I do to inherit eternal life?" and, later, "Who is my neighbor?" Jesus asks him to note the heart of the Law and it is, indeed, on his lips and in his heart: *Love God and love your neighbor as yourself.* The scholar continues to question: "Who's my neighbor?"

Jesus then shares a story that reveals a deeper and more challenging definition than the scholar may have expected. I believe that both questions that the scholar put to Jesus and the parable are also valuable teachable moments for our life!

Although we might reply as the scholar did, to love God and neighbor, yet in the context of our life, the meaning is clearly challenging. It calls us to an inclusive and all-embracing love response to God. If we are honest, life takes us in so many directions that we are lucky to give attention to even the needs of the present moment let alone living the total commitment to love God and love of neighbor. How then do we do this? I have found that while I cannot split my attention, I am mindful that I need to be focused and open to God's presence however brief it might be. The Divine who always dwells within can and will provide new energy to what you and I do. God's Spirit is always ready to be invited into the ordinary moments of our life. Morning Prayer and whatever additional time we can give to daily prayer helps to better honor God's presence and be compassionate to those who in our culture may be dismissed or judged because of their color, creed, height, weight, orientation, or whatever label is invented.

The victim in this story is left to the mercy of passersby: a Jewish priest, a Levite (a Jewish sacristan), and a Samaritan. Two of them have religious duties to attend to, that meant that caring for the stranger would have been ritually prohibitive. We all know what rationalizations are. It's to figure out an excuse not to do what we really should do, right? We tend to justify it to ourselves. I must serve the people, I have to do this, I have to do that. It's about ritual impurity in the case of the two passersby. And what is our excuse?

We are told that a Samaritan traveler whom the Jews looked down on as inferior did what he could to care for the Jew who had been robbed and beaten. This Samaritan tended to the wounded man and even assured the innkeeper that he will pay for whatever further needs the man might have incurred. What a special heart this Samaritan had who touched the man's tragedy so spontaneously. No excuses, just a caring heart! We too have a God whose compassion and caring is not just loving but going out of the way to help, to heal and to make us feel that we belong. Nor is it a "good" deed done to be ethical but a searing of our heart, seeing the condition of a fellow human being who is helpless and needs care. All of us who breathe the same earth air are given this opportunity to go and *do likewise* for our neighbors.

We have already been gifted with eternal life. It is totally gratuitous. This was confirmed by our Baptism. We don't do things to earn this God-given gift. We only have to open our heart to the gift that is ours. For the loving is in the living and the living is in the loving. God's gift to us and our gift of ourselves to God is about serving and loving our neighbor.



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
