The presence of Christ by the power of his word and the Holy Spirit (continued)

1380 It is highly fitting that Christ should have wanted to remain present to his Church in this unique way. Since Christ was about to take his departure from his own in his visible form, he wanted to give us his sacramental presence; since he was about to offer himself on the cross to save us, he wanted us to have the memorial of the love with which he loved us "to the end," even to the giving of his life. In his Eucharistic presence he remains mysteriously in our midst as the one who loved us and gave himself up for us, and he remains under signs that express and communicate this love:

The Church and the world have a great need for Eucharistic worship. Jesus awaits us in this sacrament of love. Let us not refuse the time to go to meet him in adoration, in contemplation full of faith, and open to making amends for the serious offenses and crimes of the world. Let our adoration never cease.


1381 "That in this sacrament are the true Body of Christ and his true Blood is something that 'cannot be apprehended by the senses,' says St. Thomas, 'but only by faith, which relies on divine authority.' For this reason, in a commentary on Luke 22:19 ('This is my body which is given for you.'), St.

Cyril says: 'Do not doubt whether this is true, but rather receive the words of the Savior in faith, for since he is the truth, he cannot lie.'"

## REFLECTION



Reflection by Gary and Nancy Dorighi... Gospel John 10: 1-10

The gospel theme of the Good Shepherd is easy to understand and one of our favorites. Jesus is the shepherd, and we are the sheep. He knows each of us by name, cares for and protects us. As sheep, we follow Jesus and trust in Him.

The image of a shepherd seeking out a lost sheep and bringing it back to the fold is a very comforting message. In the second part of the gospel, Jesus compares Himself to the "gate" that protects the sheep. We are reminded of the dangers that lurk in the world and within us that can lead us astray: selfishness, deceit, judging others, envy, greed, conceit, and so on. Just as thieves and robbers are thwarted by the protection of a gate, Jesus is our "gate" protecting us from these evils and providing the path to eternal life through Him.

Keeping our hearts and minds attuned to Jesus can be challenging in our busy complicated daily lives. We need to continuously refocus ourselves on the goal of attaining eternal life through the message of Jesus: faith, hope, and love. Through prayer and good deeds we listen to His voice and follow Him through the gate to the Father.

### An Afghan Family Story

Jaweed and Benafsha came to the U.S. 5 years ago. Jaweed went to Chabot College to get the education he needed to enroll in Tesla's Mechanic Training program. He paid rent and bills as a Lyft driver at night during that time. They were able to move from a one bedroom apartment to a two bedroom apartment in Fremont close to Tesla where he works. They are now U.S. citizens, their son is in first grade and they have a beautiful 2 year old daughter! A month ago, Benafsha's sister, brother-in-law and 3 year old niece arrived through the Jewish Refugee

Program and moved in with them. They found an apartment and Jaweed covered the first month's rent and deposit, we were able to help them with the security deposit needed to get the keys to their new home. Then, Ramadan ended last week and after Eid we were able to fill in their new home with beds and linens, table and chairs, bath and kitchen items. Jaweed was able to help his brother-in-law, Mir, get a job at Tesla so Mir can take on their rent himself soon.

This story is not yet finished as Benafsh's parents and younger brother and sister arrived just a week ago! Where will this story go next? Our Refugee Team is here to help, thanks to your continuing generosity for these families. *THANK YOU!*

#### Monday, May 01, 2023—In praise of those who do good work



The common theme is that they honor the often low-profile work of keeping church, family, and society running. The men and women who take up these tasks deserve more than one day of thanks- even though they're usually the type who never expect it. Maybe you're blessed to be one of them, who humbly serves and sacrifices and asks for little in return. On this day, and every day, let our gratitude be shown and felt for all the workers who dedicate their lives to making our lives better.

#### MEMORIAL OF JOSEPH THE WORKER

TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 11:1-18; John 10:11-18 (279) or Genesis 1:26-2:3 or Colossians 3:14-15, 17, 23-24; Matthew 13:54-58 (559). "I am the good shepherd. A good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep."

#### Tuesday, May 02, 2023—Everything everywhere all the time

Thank Saint Athanasius upon reciting the word "consubstantial"-which used to be "one in being with the Father"-the next time you say the Nicene Creed. Athanasius, as deacon, did the theological homework for his bishop, Saint Alexander I, at the Council of Nicea. Together they resisted Arianism. Prior to the council, the central idea of Arianism had been slowly gaining traction among church leaders: that Jesus wasn't God, wasn't co-equal and coeternal with the Father as taught by the Christian doctrine of the



Trinity. As Athanasius insisted of Jesus and the Incarnation, "there is no part of creation deprived of his presence; together with his Father, he fills everything, everywhere, at all times."

MEMORIAL OF ATHANASIUS, BISHOP, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 11:19-26; John 10:22-30 (280). "The Father and I are one."

#### Wednesday, May 03, 2023—What remains is the legacy

Today the church celebrates the feast of two of the 12 apostles, Philip and James, a peculiar pair of martyrs not otherwise associated with one another in Christian history or tradition. James (also called James the Less) is regarded as the first Bishop of Jerusalem, while Philip was said to have preached in Greece, Turkey, and Syria. The pairing of their feast days is related to their shared reliquary in the Church of the

Twelve Apostles, following a secret move from the Roman Catacombs. Thereafter lost to history for some time, their relics

were rediscovered in the church crypt in the 19th century. On this holy feast, let's all remember the sacrifices of the church's first teachers and model their lives of holiness and faith.

#### FEAST OF PHILIP AND JAMES, APOSTLES

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Corinthians 15:1-8; John 14:6-14 (561). "[Jesus] was raised on the third day . . . After that he appeared to James, then to all the Apostles."

#### Thursday, May 04, 2023—We are a people with a history

When asked to speak at a gathering of the Jewish community in the early days of the church, Paul gives a history lesson. He recounts the liberating activity of God throughout Jewish history and ties God's activity directly to the arrival of Jesus the Messiah and the opening of salvation to all humanity. Our God is the God of history, and our human stories—personal and collective—are part of a much larger historical project of salvation. Play your part in the drama.

#### EASTER WEEKDAY

TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 13:13-25; John 13:16-20 (282). "Fellow children of Israel and you others who are God-fearing, listen. The God of this people Israel chose our ancestors."

#### Friday, May 05, 2023—Witness this

Saints and martyrs are the shining lights when it comes to witnessing to Jesus the Christ, often giving their whole lives and their very lives to communicate God's great love. We too are called to be witnesses. "But I'm no saint!" one might protest. "I can't witness like that." You don't have to be! Pope Francis reminds us that "God guides history through the humble courage of those who pray, love, and forgive. There are so many hidden saints, saints who are next-door, hidden witnesses of life, who with little acts of love change history." Next time in prayer, ask God how you've been a hidden witness of God's great love. EASTER WEEKDAY

TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 13:26-33; John 14:1-6 (283). "These are now his witnesses before the people. We ourselves are proclaiming this good news to you."

#### Saturday, May 06, 2023—Choose your destination

Can someone really be destined, or "predestined," for eternal life? According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church, our destiny as beings created by God is eternal life. But because we are free, we can choose to opt out of that destiny. Just like the people invited to the wedding feast in the Lord's parable, we can decide not to come or simply fail to show up. Just so, when we choose to live in hate rather than love, in violence rather than peace, in punishment rather than forgiveness, we're choosing another destiny. The choice is ours. EASTER WEEKDAY
